Why Your Cover Letter Matters

A cover letter is your first impression with a journal editor. It introduces your manuscript, explains its significance, confirms it meets submission requirements, and makes the case for why it belongs in that specific journal. A compelling cover letter can be the difference between desk rejection and peer review.

Customization Checklist

Replace all bracketed placeholders with your actual information

Research the journal's aims and scope before writing your fit paragraph

Address the letter to the specific editor if their name is listed on the journal website

Keep the letter to one page — editors do not read long cover letters

Confirm word count and formatting match the journal's submission guidelines

Proofread carefully — errors in the cover letter signal carelessness to editors

Do NOT submit the same cover letter to multiple journals simultaneously

Common Mistakes to Avoid

Mistake	Why It Matters
Generic opening	Saying 'I am submitting a paper' without naming the journal signals a mass submission.
Overselling	Let your manuscript speak for itself. Avoid claiming it is 'groundbreaking' or 'revolutionary.'
Summarizing too much	The cover letter introduces — it does not replace the abstract.
Missing declarations	Always include originality, no concurrent submission, and conflict of interest statements.
